Noojimo'iwewin: The Violence Against Women Act and Indian Child Welfare Act Annual Training

BAY MILLS — Bay Mills Indian Community will host its annual <u>Noojimo'iwewin: The Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) and Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA) Training</u> on Aug. 6-8. In its 7th year, Noojimo'iwewin will focus on: **From Policy to Practice**. <u>Registration</u> is open, and this training is free of charge.

Each unit is thoughtfully designed to help participants assess and strengthen effective service strategies that promote community safety. These engaging sessions will be led by expert faculty and panelists from Michigan and across the United States.

- ICWA in Court: Practical Considerations for Practitioners in Tribal and State Courts
